

Children chose one piece of homework per week, options underlined are compulsory pieces. If your child completes a piece of work outside of their homework book we would appreciate it if you could take a photograph and stick it into their book as evidence.

Choose a times table that your are confident with and write it out using Roman Numerals (Remember to practice times tables weekly in your times table journal)

Research, design and make your own Roman shield! You will need to research design colour and shape in order to make it authentic!

Write down a word related to the Romans for each letter of the alphabet.

Create a word search or crossword puzzle containing some the key Roman vocabulary you have learned. Bring your puzzle into school for your friends to solve.

# THE ROMANS

Research a Roman God or Goddess of your choice. Create a fact file based on what you find!

Research a significant event in Roman history and create a newspaper article. It could be something new or something we have looked at in school e.g Caesar's invasion of Britain or Boudicca's rebellion

Draw a map of the Roman Empire. Label the map with names the Roman's had for their countries or regions.

Try to find a map of Roman Britain. Find out some of the names of towns and cities. What are their modern names? Many names ending in chester or caster were probably Roman military centres. Do you know why and can you think of any near to us?

Homework is due on Thursday and books are sent home when homework has been shown in class. If you child forgets their book, a copy of the homework web is on the 'Class 3' page of the School's website along with a termly overview of our learning.

Research a Roman recipe to create at home. Take a photograph and give it a professional chefs review. Feel free to bring your creation to school with you for the Class to review!

Create your own symmetrical Roman mosaic using media of your own choice.

Roman soldiers needed to be fit and tough to be effective warriors. Find out how Roman soldiers trained and kept fit and healthy.

Borrow a Roman book from school and read it with an adult. You might already be an expert on some of the things you read - maybe you could teach someone at home about it?
